 - ~500 CVs
 - ~250 Research statements
 - ~1000 Reference Letters

Before Applying



- Network
 - At conferences
 - Tradeoff: chances of establishing communication vs. obtrusiveness
 - Tag along people you know
 - Contribute to conversation with insight
 - Talk to visitors
 - Practice your elevator pitch
 - Internships

Applying



- Heavily dependent on place
- Most common calendar:
 - Application: December
 - Interview: February-March
 - Decisions: March-April
- Carefully prepare your application package
- Broad set of reference letters helps

Interviewing



- Job talk
 - Practice, practice, practice
 - Tend to be interactive aim for 50% of allotted time
 - Long talks can be exasperating (put yourself in shoes of audience member after hearing 10 job talks)
- One-on-one interviews
 - Important to show breadth
 - Two-way process:
 - Be prepared to summarize your work
 - Interrupt and ask questions about other people's work
